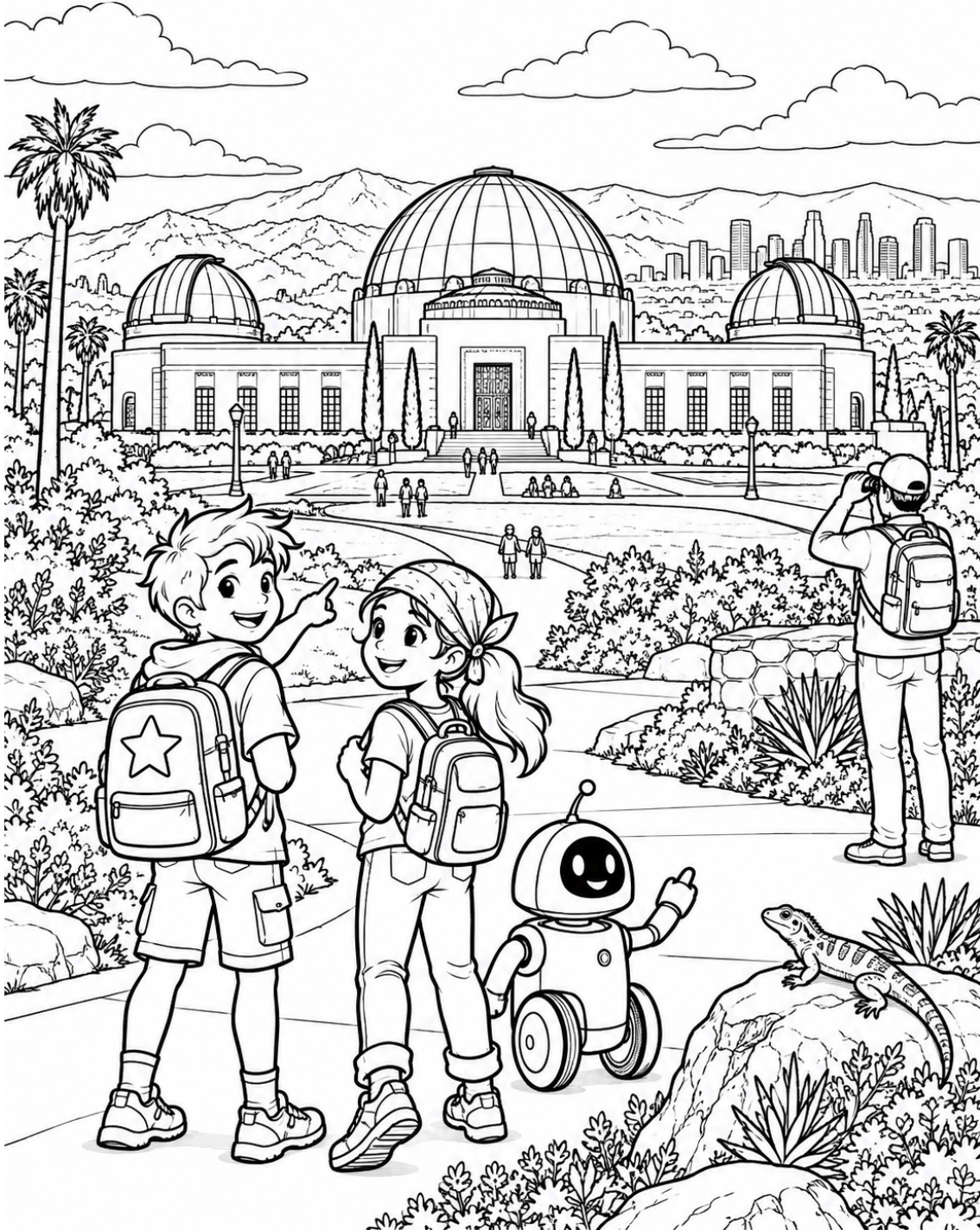

A sky full of questions

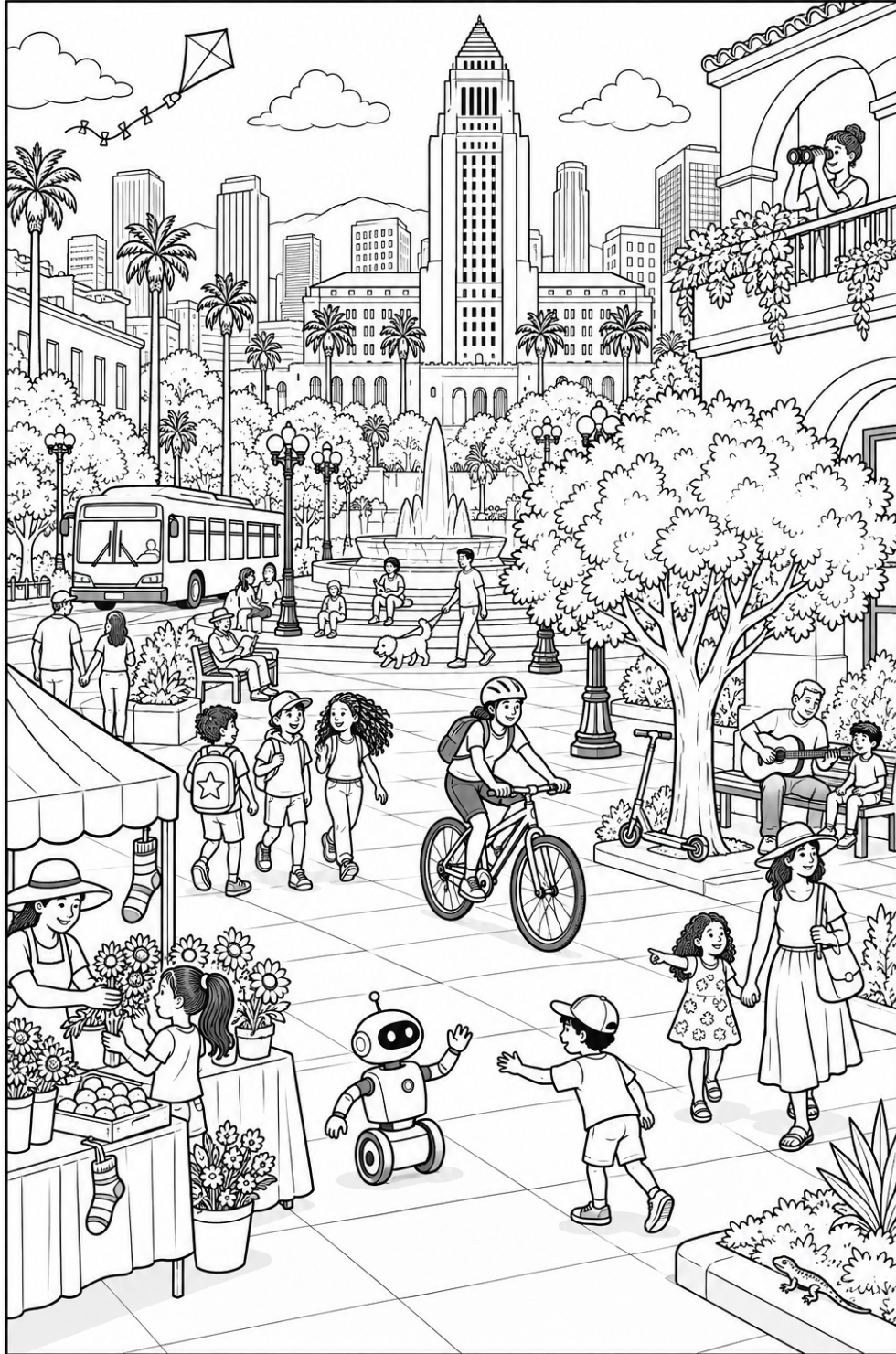
Griffith Observatory opened to the public on May 15, 1935. What would you like to discover?

Every city has a story

Use these clues after exploring. The drawings are stylized, imaginative scenes, not navigation maps.

Kite	Upper-left sky.
Binoculars	Person on the upper-right balcony.
Star backpack	Child left of the bicycle, below the bus.
Scooter	Beside the tree on the right, above the robot.
Striped sock	Two hang from the market on the left. Finding either completes the item.
Lizard	On the lower-right curb, beside the plants.

For family review: Which scene was easiest to color? Which object was hardest to find? Were the instructions clear? This sample assumes ages 7-10; difficulty and print comfort still need real family testing.

Artwork: Three AI-generated original scene drafts, composed into this sample with an original activity layout. Character consistency, reference rights and final 300-DPI print assets remain production checks. There is no city, venue, sports-team or event endorsement.

Fact sources: Griffith Observatory official historical timeline; City of Los Angeles historical documentation; City of Santa Monica pier history and city geography. Source links and asset provenance are retained in the accompanying project files.
